### From the Pastor

Intention & Action
Stranger & Neighbor

These are some of the many opposites and binaries we navigate in our faith lives that our Lenten theme: "Everything [in] Between" invited us to ponder. I found the invitation to navigate these ideas with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed enlightening, freeing, and insightful while helping me deepen my own relationship with God and scripture. Rather than focusing so heavily on one binary or the other, we are invited to see how God is in and between these ideas, allowing us to expand our understanding of who God is and how God works in the world.

When we free ourselves from binaries that seek to divide us, we begin to see how God creates in spectrums and invites us to live in between as our authentic selves. We begin to recognize the ways we can hold both rest and growth, shouting and silence, grief and hope, doubt and belief in tension with each other and with the grace to navigate between at different stages of life.

As human beings, we so often want easy answers rather than sit in the difficult, often uncomfortable questions. When we sit with the ways God is working between everything and not just in the opposites and binaries, we start to become more comfortable with the unknown. I've found that in those spaces of unknown, it can be hard to sit in the silence and listen to God, and yet that is exactly where God is inviting us to be. How can we see everyone around us as both a stranger and a neighbor – treating them fairly and justly with kindness and mercy? How is God calling us to embrace righteousness and mercy for the benefit of all of God's creation? Where are we invited to challenge the binaries of acceptance and resistance in favor of a way forward together?

When we sit in the discomfort, the silence, and the in-betweens, we can start to acknowledge God's presence all around us – not just in the binaries, but through everything in between. I hope this theme and these ideas continue to influence and impact your faith and relationship with our beautiful, inclusive, and diverse God.

# Church Council Highlights

- On March 23, at a special congregational meeting, the congregation unanimously approved the motion to pay off the mortgage on the parsonage with money from the Perzin funds.
- Pastor Courtney has a very well-planned Family Leave Plan that she has shared with the Council, which leaves us very well covered and feeling confident in our knowledge of worship and general church operations. It is a Google Doc that is available to all Council Members and Ashley in the office. Please reach out if you have any questions.
- \$1,000 in Thrivent Choice Dollars will be moved into the Youth account.
- The Impact Award to be presented by Messiah Lutheran Church is a \$500 award, open to all Indian Hills graduating seniors, regardless of GPA, seeking further education beyond high school, such as colleges or trade schools. The applicant's essay should describe a way they have a positive impact following their passion, describe a service project, or describe something they are passionate about and why.
- Messiah in Action: 56 Thrivent water and solar light kits were put together in the last month.
- The mortgage was paid off on April 7<sup>th</sup>! The final payoff was \$73,938.39. We moved 50K from Vanguard to pay it off; the rest was in our Columbia account. Every quarter, we will review the money at Colombia Bank to decide if any of it should be moved to Vanguard.

On Saturday, May 3rd, from 10am - 2pm, we will be partnering with Ponds and St Alban's to host a car wash. All proceeds will be split between our various ministries to fight hunger. It is also the day of the Oakland town-wide garage sale and we've been added to the map. If you have some items you would like to donate to the cause, bring them to church on Sunday April 27th or the day of and we'll mark it for sale. Any items left will be donated to various charities.

The June 8<sup>th</sup> coffee hour will be devoted to hearing your ideas for the distribution of funds acquired from the sale of the Perzin property. As good stewards of the bounty we have received, we will be tithing, giving 10% of what we have received, to organizations and projects that need our support. We were able to share 65 Easter Dinner Kits with our pantry guests in the two weeks prior to Easter! In addition, over 50 Easter baskets were assembled by parents and grandparents who are in need. Your support of the pantry is allowing us to have more food on our shelves while serving over 25 families each week. We are seeing new people come to the pantry for food each week. We are hosting a Spring Cleaning Campaign in May and June to collect cleaning supplies for our pantry guests, knowing a cleaner home is a healthier home. You may drop cleaning supplies in the grocery cart at church, and they will be delivered to the pantry.

Currently the Most Needed Items at the pantry are toilet paper, paper towels, tissues, bar soap, body wash, shampoo, deodorant, ketchup, mayonnaise, canned chicken, canned ravioli, canned chili, and snacks for children.

### 2025 Congregation Star Word: Justice

We continue to learn about our Star Word "Justice" and the ways it guides our ministry and mission as people of Christ. Justice is defined as maintenance or administration of what is just and right.

Social Justice: The view that everyone deserves equal economic, political and social rights and opportunities. The term was first introduced in the mid-1800's by Italian Jesuit Luigi Tapparelli d'Azeglio after seeing extreme levels of inequality and distress caused by the social class system in Europe. He coined the term to say that we should not only do the right thing but strive to do what is necessary for the betterment of others.

Elements of social justice focus on:

- Access: ensuring all people have access to the same goods and services like education, health care, financial assistance
- Equity: implementing fair and impartial opportunities for all people and making the necessary accommodation to reduce systemic barriers
- Diversity: embracing and uplifting God's beautiful and diverse creation without barriers and divisions
- Participation: allowing and encouraging all people to have opportunities and platforms in making policies that affect their well-being
- Human Rights: fundamental rights all people should have regardless of sex, race, nationality, ethnicity, religion, etc.

What does it mean to be woke? In the recent years the term "woke" has been used to refer to people who are engaged in social justice. While it has been used

in a negative and mean way, I want to take a moment to define it for you. To be "woke" means to be awakened to the needs of others, to be well informed, thoughtful, compassionate, humble, and kind. Someone who is "woke" is eager to make the world a better place for all people. This is nothing new! Using the definition, Jesus was woke – he was eager to make the world around him look more like the Kingdom of God, where all needs are met, all are cared for, and all have what they need!

Many of our outreach projects at Messiah focus on social justice and creating opportunities for others. Advocacy is one of the biggest ways we can take our work from helping folks temporarily to changing their lives for the better. In a recent workshop, I was reminded that stages of discipleship span from helping at the food pantry to serving community meals, but also includes the need to contact our legislators to advocate for funding for food stamps and feeding programs.

During his earthly ministry, Jesus could be physically present in only one place at any given time. "Only those could speak to him who came to where he was," explained Archbishop William Temple. Spiritually speaking, Christ's Ascension means he is with us wherever we find ourselves. Christ desires to be present with us everywhere we go. His presence is universal. He is here now. "Believed in throughout the world, taken up in glory" (1 Timothy 3:16, NRSV) — that is what the Ascension affirms.


